How Was Your Christmas?

"... and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. She wrapped him in cloths and placed in a manger, because there was room in the inn." Luke 2:7

"Once in our world, a stable had something in it that was bigger than our whole world." – C.S. Lewis

You've heard about "preaching to the choir"? That's when we give a message to people who already know and believe it. If I say to you that the significance of Christmas is the Christ who came to earth to be the Savior from our sins – I expect you know that; you believe it.

So, here's a question you will hear: "How was your Christmas?" Most of us, I expect, just say it was good or fine. Sometimes we might begin to say who was there and what we did.

How about a closer look at the question? In looking back at Christmas gatherings over the years what made them truly memorable? We work very hard at gifts but do they make Christmas good? And I don't envy all the work some (mostly women) put in on food. I enjoy the food – everything except sweet potatoes – but does that make or break the time?

Looking back over my decades of Christmas experience there's some kinds of things which stand out. I remember some special times which included a special and intimate conversation. There are special worship experiences which stand out both in church and among family. And I got to thinking, what if we worked as hard at helping create those as we do for gifts, decorating or food? How about these?

+*We read the Christmas narrative and then ask, "Who is the most interesting character, besides Jesus, to you? Why?*

+We reminisce about a gift that had special meaning and share that.

+*We think about those who are not with us anymore and share appreciation and memories.*

+We attend a worship experience and then, later, share about what made it special or what kind of thoughts came to mind.



You can think of others. But it takes some planning. Remember that the stable didn't just appear, but God had planned it. It is so easy in the busyness of the season to just skip these kinds of things and try again next year.

Christmas is built on the truth that God sent His Son to be our Savior. It was no

accident. The Old Testament prophets predicted it. Our Christmas need not be an accident either. Think what might make it special and what you could do to make that happen.
